Tara Maria Lovett is a Cavan based playwright. Literary awards include Fingal Scribe Playwriting Award in 2000 for her one-act piece 'The Shape", the O.Z. Whitehead Playwriting Competition for 'Action Man' (2001), the Sean Dunne Literary Award for 'The Hen House' (2002) and the Eamon Keane award for best full-length play for 'The Piano Lesson' (Listowel Writers Week, 2002). "Black is the Colour" was chosen for new work development by The New theatre in 2020. Professional productions include "The Shape" and "WatchDog" Focus Theatre 2001, "The Suck" Project Arts Centre 2001, "The Call" in the Crypt Dublin Castle 2002 shortlisted for an Irish Times Theatre Award, and "The Mass Rock" in Smock Alley in 2012. "The Tide" premiered in The New Theatre in September 2019. "The Whispering Chair" was produced in The Cavan County Museum in 2022 by Livin Dred Theatre.

Declan Gorman is a native of Monaghan. He has worked as an actor, writer, director and educator. He was co-founder with Joe O'Byrne of Co-Motion, Dublin acting in many 1980s shows, including Song of the White Man's Burden and The Sinking of the Titanic. From 1990 – 95 he was Theatre Programmer at City Arts Centre Dublin. From 1997 – 2010 he was Artistic Director of Upstate, Drogheda, where he wrote and directed *The Weavers* (after Hauptmann); The Green Fool (after Kavanagh); Hades (Stewart Parker/BBC Award); Epic and At Peace. Freelance since 2010, he has toured in Ireland, Norway, Russia (pre-Ukraine invasion), USA, Britain and India, with his James Joyce solo shows The Dubliners Dilemma and Falling Through the Universe. He has led public art and community theatre projects in Monaghan, Louth and Dublin, and taught communityengaged theatre at NUI Galway and New York University. His 2016 play The Big Fellow (after Frank O'Connor) toured in Ireland and to India. He co-wrote and directed Dorothy McArdle: Prison Notebooks with performer Sharon McArdle (Kilmainham Gaol /Smock Alley 2022). During Covid he directed "The Pilgrims of Slieve" a play for Zoom devised by Aisteoirí Muinchille. He is currently visiting writer on the Bordering Realities project collaborating with Cavan playwright Alice Lynch and the Killesher Youth Drama Society.

Joshua McEneaney is from Dublin and has recently graduated from The Lir Academy. In the last year he has has been in productions including: "The Aliens" by Annie baker directed by Ellen Buckley, "Untitled" a devised work directed by Wayne Jordan, "Bullrusher" by Eisa Davis directed by Claire O'Reilly, "The Winters Tale" by William Shakespeare directed by Conall Morrison and "Lady Windermere's Fan" by Oscar Wilde directed by Tom Creed.

Niamh McPhillips is from Co. Monaghan. She has been in several physical theatre productions, most recently a children's clown show, 'Hear Me Speak' by Miriam Needham in the Hawk's Well Theatre. She studied at TU Dublin Conservatoire of Music and Drama graduating with a BA in Drama (Performance). Her final year production was Carly Churchill's play of 'LOVE AND INFORMATION' directed by Ronan Phelan. She was recently performing as Inga Ingram, in the world premiere of 'Looking At The Sun' by Emily Bohannon at the Smock Alley Theatre and Civic Theatre. Niamh has worked in several different forms of drama such as Dance, Audio and Opera. She is an alumnus of Monaghan Youth Theatre. She has performed in visual artist Lisa Freeman's 'Slipped, Fell and Smacked my Face off the Dance Floor' and Jesse Jones' 'The Tower'. She collaborated on CoisCéim Broadreach's project: BUILDING SPACES OF POSSIBILITY which saw her work with choreographer Muirne Bloomer and Dr. Niamh Shaw.

Erin Lynch studied Costume design for stage and screen in Inchicore College of Further Education from 2016-2018.
